

ASSESSING ADHD WITH THE BASC-3, Brown ADD and Attemo

Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) affects approximately 11% of those ages 4–17 years and approximately 5% of the adult population. Young males are almost three times more likely to be diagnosed with ADHD, despite recent research showing that young females may be more adversely affected by ADHD. Additionally, the most prominent symptoms of ADHD – inattentiveness, hyperactivity, and impulsivity – can often be mimicked by other disorders making the differential diagnosis between ADHD and other mental health disorders (some of which are often comorbid with ADHD) key to a proper psychological evaluation. This presentation will look at the various broad band and narrow band assessment tools that can aid in the assessment of ADHD. We will cover a new continuous performance measure (i.e. Attemo), assessments that take into account caregiver and teacher perspectives (i.e. BASC-3), self-report measures (i.e. Brown ADD and BASC-3), and digital assessment tools (i.e. Tea-CH2 and Q-interactive). Best practice regarding the assessment of ADHD will also be discussed.
