# PROLONGED GRIEF DISORDER: BASICS AND BEYOND

Although COVID-19 and other epidemics are exerting devastating effects globally, a "second wave" of secondary mental health consequences is well underway. This presentation will discuss both the challenges currently facing our healthcare system, as well as opportunities to raise the national standard of bereavement care. These opportunities include (a) the introduction of a new grief disorder (Prolonged Grief Disorder) in DSM-5-TR; (b) the development of strength-based theories of grief; (c) new measures with which to assess for bereavement and grief; (d) recently developed interventions for prolonged grief disorder; and (e) the development of training curricula. This presentation will review criteria for the new Prolonged Grief Disorder and key risk factors, multidimensional grief theory, measures for assessing prolonged grief disorder, available treatments, and tools for building bereavement-related competencies in care providers. The presentation will conclude with practical recommendations for distinguishing grief from related conditions including PTSD and depression, promoting adaptive grief reactions, and creating risk screening and referral networks.

# **ABOUT THE PRESENTER**

Christopher Layne, Ph.D. is an associate professor of psychology at Nova Southeastern University, where he directs a training clinic specializing in assessing and treating traumatized and bereaved youth. He also directs the National Child Trauma Workforce Institute, an NCTSN Category II center dedicated to creating, evaluating, and broadly disseminating the Core Curriculum on Childhood Trauma. He has been actively building multidimensional grief theory, grief assessment measures, manualized interventions for bereaved youth, and training curricula for building grief-related competencies since the late 1990's, when he served as a post-doctoral fellow in war-torn Bosnia. Dr. Layne's professional interests include traumatic stress and bereavement and their implications for developmental psychopathology, professional education, evidence-based practice, evidence-based assessment, theory building, research methods, and intervention.
