

PROLONGED EXPOSURE THERAPY FOR COMBAT-RELATED PTSD: 20 YEARS OF PROGRESS

Combat-related posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD) includes many unique features that are not present in most civilian traumas. This didactic presentation will start with a clinical case of treating combat-related PTSD while the presenter was deployed with the U.S. military in 2004 using an adapted version of prolonged exposure therapy. The presentation will then review a series of iterative research projects that have been conducted over the past 20 years to advance the science on the use of various adaptations of prolonged exposure for the treatment of PTSD. The presentation will conclude with a review of the current research gaps and the need for additional research.

ABOUT THE PRESENTER

Alan L. Peterson, PhD, ABPP is a Professor and the Chief of the Division of Behavioral Medicine in the Department of Psychiatry & Behavioral Sciences at the University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio. He is the Director of the STRONG STAR consortium, which includes over 150 research collaborators and 50 institutions worldwide. He retired from the U.S. Air Force in 2005 after 21 years of active duty service including deployments in support of Operations Noble Eagle, Enduring Freedom, and Iraqi Freedom. He has clinical and research expertise in the areas of behavioral medicine, psychological trauma, and resiliency. He has published 7 books, over 385 scientific manuscripts, and given over 700 presentations and invited addresses at national and international meetings.
