STRESS FIRST AID IN HEALTHCARE: A SELF-CARE AND PEER SUPPORT MODEL

This presentation will explore the unique occupational stressors and trauma exposure faced by healthcare workers (HCWs), which can significantly affect their mental health and contribute to stress, anxiety, depression, post-traumatic stress disorder, and burnout. It will describe the adaptation and implementation of Stress First Aid (SFA), a peer support and self-care model introduced within a large healthcare system. Presenters will review the evidence base supporting SFA and discuss its application across diverse healthcare settings. The session will include an overview of SFA's core components, training processes, and integration into the Northwell Health system, where it has reached more than 35,000 HCWs to date. Outcome data related to self-efficacy, stress, perceived support, resource awareness, burnout, and resilience will be presented. The presentation will conclude with key lessons learned and practical strategies for integrating SFA into a variety of workplace contexts, including examples of supporting healthcare providers, addressing implementation challenges, and incorporating SFA into existing workflows.

Tiana Skawinski, PsyD is a licensed clinical psychologist in the state of New York who provides specialized PTSD and trauma treatment, as well as resilience support, for healthcare workers and community members at Northwell Health's *Center for Traumatic Stress, Resilience, and Recovery*. She began her career in the mental health field as a social worker, delivering clinical care to individuals impacted by trauma and serious mental illness (SMI). A proud graduate of Nova Southeastern University and TRIP alumna, Dr. Skawinski completed her predoctoral internship at Hartford Hospital's Institute of Living and her postdoctoral fellowship with the PTSD Clinical Team at the Louis Stokes Cleveland VA Medical Center. Her work is driven by a commitment to helping individuals restore, or discover, a sense of control, balance, and well-being in their lives.

Mayer Bellehsen, PhD, is an Assistant Vice President in the Behavioral Health Service Line at Northwell Health. He is a licensed Clinical Psychologist who received his Doctorate in Clinical Psychology with a Health Emphasis in 2011 from the Ferkauf Graduate School of Psychology at Yeshiva University. Dr. Bellehsen has had extensive experience providing and overseeing behavioral health services for individuals and families impacted by trauma as well as publishing and teaching on topics related to the treatment of traumatic stress related conditions. Dr. Bellehsen most recently codeveloped and now oversees the Center for Traumatic Stress, Resilience and Recovery (CTSRR) at Northwell Health. The center provides clinical and resilience services for health care workers and community members impacted by traumatic stress and is conducting research on the impact of COVID-19 and stress on health care worker wellbeing. Additionally, the center provides clinical services to NYPD uniformed officers through the Finest Care program, a short-term solution for officers seeking confidential behavioral health care access outside of their employer. Dr. Bellehsen is also the founding Director of the Unified Behavioral Health Center for Military Veterans and their Families: Northwell Health, which provides access to behavioral healthcare for US Military Service Members, Veterans and their families through partnership with the Northport VA.

Annmarie Wacha-Montes, PsyD is the clinical director for the Center for Traumatic Stress, Resilience and Recovery at Northwell Healthcare in NY and is licensed in NY and NJ. She is a graduate from Nova Southeastern University and alumni from Guided Self-Change Clinic and TRIP. She completed her internship at the Syracuse VA and fellowship in McLean Hospital in the Women's Trauma Center. Dr. Wacha-Montes specializes in trauma and co-occurring issues, health concerns, crisis response, suicide prevention and community psychology. She has spent much of her career creating and managing services and programs to build resilience and improve accessibility to care in healthcare systems and higher education. Her work has also included efforts related to diversity, equity and inclusion.
