<p>The practicum at the Clinic for Research and Treatment (CRT) is an innovative center that provides training, development, and therapeutic initiatives designed to enhance the quality of life for service members by equipping them with essential life and self-regulation skills. Our principal program is a pioneering approach to treatment in collaboration with The Veterans Trust by blending elements of stress inoculation treatment, simulated racing with psychological skills training to help participants improve their mental and physical health, often related to trauma. <p>ATC provides state of the art diagnosis, assessment, and treatment for adults with anxiety and other comorbid psychiatric and/or medical conditions. ATC specializes in the treatment of panic, social anxiety, GAD, specific phobias, and OCD. Students may also treat comorbid depressive, personality, trauma/PTSD, sleep, and alcohol/substance use disorders. Students will be trained in the most current manualized, evidence-based treatments which provide a nice structure for new clinicians. Students have the opportunity to learn CBT, ERP, ACT, DBT, PE and CPT. Students will also be trained in several evidence-based diagnostic/assessment measures (SCID, ADIS, WAIS, MoCA, etc.). Students will learn how to administer, score, interpret measures, and write integrated reports. Students will learn effective documentation/writing, treatment planning, and develop strong clinical skills. Training is intended to prepare students for successful CCE defense and internship placement. Opportunities may also exist to participate in research projects.</p>

We also provide diagnostic and clinical assessment for traumatic stress and bereavement-related disorders, including posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and prolonged grief disorder. First-year CATSP practicum students are strongly encouraged to enroll in Dr. Layne's section of Case Conceptualization in Winter Semester given that he will cover a broad set of core competencies that are integral to CATSP training and practice. Many of these skills also help trainees prepare for a CCE case.

The Trauma Resolution and Integration Program (TRIP) is a Psychology Services Center (PSC) clinic dedicated to helping adults who have experienced traumatic events such as childhood abuse combat, criminal assaults, rape, life threatening accidents, natural disasters or political torture to overcome the variety of difficulties that often occur as the result of the trauma. Galen Hope is a mental health treatment center in Coral Gables, FL. We provide comprehensive treatment to adolescents and adults who have primary eating disorders or primary mental health diagnoses. About 60% of the clients at Galen Hope have a primary eating disorder diagnosis though they often have other co-morbid diagnoses as well. <p>Description of the Practicum</p> <p>South Florida Evaluation and Treatment Center is a 249 bed forensic psychiatric hospital operated by Wellpath Solutions, Inc. SFETC is not a state agency and operates under a contract to the State of Florida through the Department of Children and Families. We serve men and women who have been adjudicated by the court as Incompetent to Proceed to Trial (ITP) or were found Not Guilty by Reason of Insanity (NGRI). The majority of the patients are ITP. It is the goal of SFETC to stabilize their psychiatric condition and to restore them to competency so that they may return to court and have their case adjudicated. For those declared NGRI the facility provides aggressive mental health treatment to reduce symptoms of mental illness while diminishing an individual's risk to society so that they may be discharged to a less restrictive setting. A variety of severe mental illnesses are seen at our facility, with the most frequent diagnoses being major thought and affective disorders, severe personality disorders (primarily antisocial and borderline), and substance related and addictive disorders. A number of forensic and clinical services are provided by the psychology staff to hasten the patients' return to court or to the community. These services include psychological assessments, functional assessments of behavior, individual psychotherapy, group psychotherapy, rehabilitation programs, competency evaluations, competency restoration groups, and individual competency restoration sessions. The Nicklaus Children's Hospital Psychology program is designed to provide a wide range of clinical experiences with children, adolescents, and families. The student will be responsible for providing behavioral consultation on the medical floors to children, adolescents, and their families. Psychotherapy sessions are also provided to children and adolescents with a wide range of modalities.

Consultation Liaison (12-15 hours per week): As part of the Consultation Liaison service, Practicum Students serve as consultants to physicians, medical residents, child life specialists, nutritionists and nursing personnel involving patients experiencing behavioral and emotional problems associated with a medical condition. They learn rapid assessment and differential diagnosis of psychological factors affecting a wide variety of medical conditions. The focus is on children and adolescents who have acute or chronic medical problems and prevention of complications due to medical conditions in children and adolescents. Services are provided to patients on the following inpatient/outpatient units: Neurology, Diabetes/Endocrinology, Pediatric Intensive Care, and Gastroenterology, among others. The training experience focuses on the behavioral aspects of chronic illness (e.g., diabetes, asthma, Crohn's disease, etc.), adherence with treatment regimens and problems with disease management (e.g., stress management during medical procedures), and supportive interventions for children and adolescents with chronic diseases. Cases range from pain management to complex family dysfunction and provide training experiences in behavioral interventions and prevention of psychological adjustment problems. Training is provided in consultation, assessment, and treatment before, during and after medical interventions. Practicum Students participate as members of multi-disciplinary teams providing comprehensive health care. Multidisciplinary teams consist of physicians, nurses, social workers, child life specialists, speech/language pathologists, occupational and physical therapists, and patient advocates. Practicum Students typically complete 2-3 consults per day. In addition to the Consultation Liaison rotation patients, students are required to do outpatient therapy follow-ups with 5 patients a week, as needed.

Outpatient Therapy (5-7 hours per week): Outpatient therapy is provided to children and adolescents with a wide range of academic, behavioral, and developmental concerns on individual basis. Practicum Students receive training in individual, family and group modalities and will be able to apply psychotherapeutic techniques. They acquire experience with children, adolescents and family members utilizing both long term and short-term modalities. They will be able to develop and implement therapeutic interventions for children experiencing emotional concerns, behavioral disruption and family systems dysfunction. They will also develop and implement interventions for behavioral/emotional problems associated with chronic and acute medical conditions. Children and adolescents who are presenting with or are at risk for emotional and behavioral problems are seen. Children from preschool age through adolescence and their families are

seen in consultation. Emphasis is on the assessment and treatment of common behavior problems including attention deficit hyperactivity disorders, mood and anxiety disorders, oppositional defiant and conduct disorders, eating and elimination disorders, trauma and developmental spectrum disorders. Cognitive-behavioral, developmental, and family systems perspectives are emphasized in understanding psychopathology and developing intervention strategies. Pediatric Health Clinics (6-8 hours per week): The Practicum Students will participate in a variety of multidisciplinary clinics and teams addressing medical conditions, such as diabetes, migraines, GI disorders, and neurodevelopmental disorders. The format on this track is a developmental process that involves observation of evaluations/interventions under direct supervision and subsequently completing the evaluations/interventions without direct supervision. Training in psychoeducational and developmental assessment is provided in the areas of clinical interview, assessment, and direct observation of the supervisor working with patients and their families.

A one-week orientation to the Nicklaus Children's Hospital and Department of Psychology is provided in the summer in August. However, starting the second Monday of July, all students are required to

attend Topic Specific Seminar at noon. This takes place every Monday at noon. Once practicum starts in August, all students are required to attend weekly Consultation Liaison group supervision at 11am and Topic Specific seminar at 12. CONSULTATION LIAISON and THERAPY PRACTICUM: Practicum students NEED to have experience working in a hospital setting or medical clinic, preferable with children and adolescents with chronic medical conditions. All coursework for Child and Adolescent Psychology, Assessment, Psychopathology, and Health Psychology (if available) should be completed before the start of practicum. Students will also be assigned 5 outpatients per week in addition to completing consults. Medical clinics such as Diabetes clinic, Headache clinic, Neurogenetics clinic, and IBD clinic are available for students certain days of the month. 1 hr of ind supervision each week and 1 hr of Clinical Group Supervision. Additional supervision when participating in clinic rotations. Outpatient therapy hours may end at 6pm some days. 10-12 direct clinical contact hours.

Description of the Practicum

This practicum site offers fourth-year doctoral students training in forensic evaluation within a private practice setting. Dr. Nicole Graham specializes in forensic psychology and neuropsychology, focusing her practice on evaluations for criminal, probate, civil, and third-party referrals. Students will gain experience in forensic interviewing, psychological and neuropsychological testing, diagnosing, court preparation, and report writing. There are no intervention hours, except for occasional assessment feedback sessions. Students will engage in 2-4 evaluations weekly, participating in clinical interviews, testing, and collateral interviews, while also observing court proceedings and the business aspects of private practice. Evaluations primarily involve adults, with some adolescents, presenting a range of psychiatric, cognitive, and personality disorders, often in challenging correctional and hospital settings. Students will encounter diverse populations, including those requiring interpreters for Spanish, Creole, or other languages. These evaluations take place in Dr. Graham's Fort Lauderdale office and in jails, hospitals, and various inpatient and outpatient treatment facilities throughout Broward and Palm Beach counties—primarily, and at times in Miami Dade county. This practicum requires maturity, discretion, and the ability to work objectively with individuals who may have complex histories and very challenging behaviors. Likewise, work in these facilities can be difficult as they may be cold, hot, loud, not always clean, with a range of smells, , and sometimes intrusive. Again, a high degree of professionalism and ability to adapt in these scenarios is a must.

Description of the Practicum

Commitment: Between August 11, 2025 through August 10, 2026, students will be expected to complete two to three clinical rotations for the duration of the training year that are often spread across 2-3 days or half days, one to two hours of individual/group supervision per week with two to four supervisors over the course of the practicum, and attendance at a weekly didactic seminar (one hour/week; Wednesdays from 12-1pm), which average to a total of 12 hours in the clinic each week. Most clinical rotations operate during normal business hours, though some may require early evening hours. Please note that in some cases students may need to exceed 12 hours in the clinic per week based on student preferences as most rotations require either a full day or a half day of clinical work. All students must pass Level II background checks and a 10-panel drug screen which includes testing for marijuana. All students will also be required to participate in the UM Mailman Center LEND (Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental Disabilities) program. The LEND program goals are to provide disciplinary and interdisciplinary leadership training to improve systems of care that work towards the prevention of developmental disabilities and ensure access to family-centered, culturally competent care for children with or at risk for neurodevelopmental disabilities and other chronic conditions and their families. As part of LEND, students would be required to complete the LEND 'Understanding the Family Perspective' (UFP). This 4-week course (meets Fridays from 9am-12pm) provides trainees with an opportunity to learn core LEND principles in a small-group, interprofessional setting. Guest speakers present on related topics. Trainees work with a faculty mentor to develop a mock advocacy project (but are not required to carry it out—just propose one) as a part of the UFP. Also, prior to participation in the UFP, trainees complete online modules in advocacy, family-centered care, interprofessional teams, transition, and cultural competence (takes about 2 hours to complete). The UFP repeats every 4 weeks so the students can take it at any point in the year, including summer if it is more convenient.

Prerequisites: Advanced students (4th and 5th Year) with coursework in child psychopathology, child development, child assessment, and child therapy. At least one practicum with children, preferable more. Spanish/Creole/French skills desirable but not required. Reliable transportation to and from the Mailman Center, and to and from community sites (if required by rotation).

Practicum Summary: The Mailman Center's comprehensive training program provides training to doctoral level psychology students from area universities and to interns and postdoctoral fellows from programs across the United States and Canada. The program is accredited by the Committee on Accreditation of the American Psychological Association. We offer experiences in psychological

assessment, evidence-based treatment, pediatric consultation and liaison, child protection, assessment and secondary prevention in at-risk populations, parent counseling, in-service training, seminars, clinical and developmental research, program evaluation, community intervention, and numerous interdisciplinary and intradisciplinary activities. Trainees gain experience with a broad spectrum of problems in a diverse cultural, ethnic, and socioeconomic pediatric population. While the faculty represents a number of theoretical positions, the program leans towards a cognitive-behavioral/systems perspective. During the application and selection process, students rank their interest in one or more of four available clinical training tracks. Students will be interviewed rotation supervisors during the application and selection period. While students will be matched to a specific track, the extent that they work on a specific rotation will be partially based on supervisor preference as well as practicum student availability on days of the rotation.

Trainees will elect two clinical rotations (in rare instances 3 rotations) over the year. Students will receive in-depth yearlong training on the rotations that they are matched to.

Clinical Training tracks include the following:

Practicum Rotation Tracks (10-12 positions available overall but will limit total Nova students to 1-2 positions per year) 1. Clinical Child Psychology Track (four positions)

Position 1 (two positions): Intervention: a) Pediatric Psychology Clinic (PPC)-Clinical Child Emphasis (4.5 hours) or PCIT (4.5 hours) AND b) Psychological Assessment Service (PAS; 8 hours)

- Rationale: This track balances intervention and assessment experiences with children and adolescents, covering a wide range of behavioral and emotional issues.

Position 2 (one position): assessment only track a) Interdisciplinary Developmental Evaluation Service (IDES) (12 hours)

- Rationale: This track focuses on comprehensive assessment of children with neurodevelopmental disorders and delays, covering a wide age range and various assessment tools.

Position 3 (one position): a) Child Protection Team (8 hours per week) b) PPC Clinical Child or Child Health (4.5 hours)

- Rationale: This track focuses on addressing child trauma and family dynamics via assessment and interviewing and combining training with evidence-based therapy approaches.

2. Pediatric Psychology Track (four positions)

Position 1 (two positions): a) Pediatric Psychology Clinic (PPC)-Child Health Emphasis (4.5 hours) AND b) Pediatric Diabetes Outpatient Clinic (8 hours) OR CF/Sleep clinic split (8 hours)

- Rationale: This track focuses on psychological interventions for children with chronic health conditions, combining outpatient therapy with specialized medical clinic experience.

Position 2 (one position): Hematology/Oncology (12 hours)

- Rationale: Designed for individuals who have some ped psych experience already and are looking to get a blend of inpatient and outpatient experience

Position 3 (one position): Pediatric Hearing Loss (12 hours)

- Rationale: Designed for individuals who want to get a blend of outpatient C&L, assessment, and therapy within an interdisciplinary clinic setting.

3. Early Childhood Intervention Track (4 Positions)

Position 1 (one position): a) Early Childhood Interventions (Early Discovery; 8 hours) and 4 to 4.5 hours of one of the following rotations: PCIT, Early Steps, Families First, or Parent Club

- Rationale: Designed for an individual that is interested in community-based implementation of services for younger children (0-7)

Position 2 (one position): a) Parent-Child Interaction Therapy (PCIT; 8 hours) and one of the following: Early Steps (4 hours) or Families First (4 hours) or Parent Club (4 hours)

- Rationale: This track specializes in assessments and interventions for young children and their families, blending community-based services with evidence-based parent training.

Position 3 (one position): a) HealthySteps (8 hours) and 4 to 4.5 hours of one of the following rotations: PCIT, Early Steps, Families First, or Parent Club

- Rationale: This track specializes specifically in birth to three.

4. Primary Care Psychology Track (Two Positions) • Position 1: (one position) a) Pediatric Primary Care Consultation (4 hours) and b) Pediatric Mobile Clinic (8 hours) • Position 2: (one position) Community Based Integrated Primary Care: School Health Initiative (12 hours) • Rationale: This track provides experience in integrating psychological services within primary care settings, including both traditional clinic, school-based, and mobile outreach services. Clinical Child Psychology Rotations (supervisors) include: the Psychological Assessment Service (PAS; Drs. Cuadra, Perez, and Farias); Pediatric Psychology Clinic- Clinical Child Emphasis (PPC; Dr. Weinstein); Parent-Child Interaction Therapy (PCIT; Drs. Jent, Weinstein, Davis, Garcia, Farias, and Acosta); Child Protection Team (CPT; Dr. Dandes); Early Steps (Dr. Berkovits); Early Childhood Interventions (Dr. Natale); Parent Club (Dr. Weinstein); Families First (Dr. Mansoor); and HealthySteps (Dr. Schenker). Pediatric/Health Psychology Rotations (supervisors) include: Pediatric Pulmonary/Cystic Fibrosis (Dr. Mali); Hematology/Oncology (Dr. Coto); Pediatric Diabetes (Dr. Mali); Pediatric Psychology Clinic-Child Health Emphasis (Drs. Delamater and Mali); School Health Initiative (Drs. Pulgaron and LaMarca); Pediatric Hearing Loss (Drs. Cejas and Coto); and Pediatric Mobile Clinic (Dr. Cuadra). Some rotations are offered as a half-day experience; others require a full-day commitment. Please note that while many rotations are based at the Mailman Center for Child Development, others are community-based (e.g., within schools, churches), and thus additional time and resources associated with commuting to these locations may be required. Rotations are elected for the entire year and are determined at the time of practicum program selection. A full description of the rotations, including days/times of clinic, clinical experiences offered, and trainee responsibilities and requirements, will be presented by rotation supervisors during orientation. Learning Goals and Objectives: The Mailman Center training program has a clinical child and pediatric focus, with an emphasis on interdisciplinary and multicultural diversity training throughout all clinical rotations. The program is structured to build skills in the core domains of clinical/developmental assessment, intervention, prevention, and consultation in pediatric populations within a variety of settings (e.g., outpatient therapy, medical inpatient and outpatient, schools, and other community sites). A core objective of the training program is to provide trainees with an awareness of the various roles and functions of the psychologist as an interdisciplinary team member. Practicum Student Roles and Contributions: Under the supervision of licensed clinical psychologists, trainees will conduct assessment, intervention, prevention and/or consultation with child and pediatric populations. The specific role and contributions of the trainee vary across clinical rotations and will be outlined by rotation supervisors during orientation. Supervision: Trainees will receive one to two hours of individual/group supervision from two to four supervisors over the course of practicum. Live supervision is available on many rotations. The amount, structure and approach to supervision vary according to the rotation and supervisor.

Clinical Hours: Approximately 12 hours weekly from August 11, 2025 through August 10, 2026. Includes one-two hours of supervision and one hour of didactics weekly. Although many rotations build in

supervision and writing time, additional time outside of clinical rotations may be required for supervision, training and preparation, and the writing of progress notes and reports. The specific clinical activities, supervision and documentation requirements vary across the rotations. This will be presented during orientation prior to the trainee's ranking of rotations.

Application Process: After approval by Nova faculty, interested students should email a copy of their CV to the Mailman Training Director (jjent@med.miami.edu) and a brief letter of interest. A brief interview (Zoom) will be scheduled to discuss the practicum experience and student training goals to ensure good match.

Description of the Practicum

The Youth Services Department is funded by Palm Beach County to provide FREE short-term therapy services for youth up to age 22. The practicum is 20 hours a week at the Education and Training Center (Ed Center), which provides family therapy, Parent-Child Interaction Therapy (PCIT; ages 2-8), individual therapy (ages 18-22 only), and parent education. The Ed Center also provides community presentations on mental health topics related to youth and families, such as building attachment, youth and social media, and managing anxiety.
