The Florida Board of Clinical Social Work, Marriage & Family Therapy and Mental Health Counseling serves as the licensing board for mental health counselors. A passing score on the National Clinical Mental Health Counseling Examination (NCMHCE) is required for licensure. The following information on NSU CMHC students' pass rates on the NCMHCE is provided on the program webpage:

Program Completion Rates

Students are admitted into graduate study and must meet matriculation requirements to become a degree candidate. Of the students who matriculated into the M.S. program in Mental Health Counseling during 2013, 77% of them were retained through graduation. Of the program graduates, 76% complete the degree within three years, while 24% complete the degree within five years. This data aligns with the program design to allow for flexibility in degree completion for learners managing multiple personal, career, and educational responsibilities.

Job Placement Rates

A convenience sample of 133 Mental Health Counseling alumni who graduated in 2017 was also used to assess job placement rates. This sample yielded the following findings:
